## Searching the Internet with a Backhoe, Not a Toothpick

Although students appear to know how to use the Internet, the reality is that they seldom know how to search effectively for academic purposes, and this lack of training often translates into poor scholastic work. Unfortunately, students tend to rely on simple Google searches, not realizing (1) how search engines determine their results, (2) which sources are most relevant and credible, and (3) what other specialized search engines exist for collecting reliable information. Teachers can assign an Internet Treasure Hunt in which students learn how to use a variety of unique search engines to find answers to their questions.

Find the answer to each question using the indicated search tool.
