



KNOW THE DIFFERENCE

There / Their / They're

There

(*adverb / introductory word*): used to indicate a place or to introduce a sentence when the main subject comes later.

The books are over **there**. (*place*)

There is a new student in class. (*introducing a sentence*)

Their

(*possessive adjective*): shows that something belongs to a person or group.

The students forgot **their** books in the classroom.

They're

(*contraction*): short for "they are".

They're excited about the party tonight

HOW TO REMEMBER

There = spelled like "**here**"
→ both refer to location

Their = ownership

They're = "they are"
